

Keep the 'Light of Christ Bright' This Advent Season



A voice cries out: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God" Isaiah 40:3

Grace and peace to you all! For those of you who don't know who I am, I am Rev. Rosalina Rivera, your new Pastor. I will officially begin on December 1st and I am looking forward to getting to know all of you as I prepare for my move next week to Oak Ridge following Thanksgiving with my family.

Prepare. That word has been rolling around my mind a lot the last several months and certainly a term we all know as we enter the season of Advent. We celebrate Advent not only by thanking God for Christ's first coming to earth as a baby, but also for his presence among us today through the Holy Spirit, and in preparation and anticipation of his final coming at the

end of the age. The word *advent* comes from the Latin term *adventus* meaning "arrival" or "coming," particularly the coming of something having great importance. Advent season, then, is both a time of joy-filled, anticipatory celebration of the arrival of Jesus Christ and a preparatory period of repentance, meditation, and penance.

For me, I have been preparing for months. Preparing for a new call. Preparing for a new home. Preparing to meet lots of new people, just to name a few. Since I have been on leave from call, I have also been spiritually preparing for the time when I will once again preside over the sacraments. It is a holy moment to baptize someone and serve the Lord's supper to all who come to receive it. Here are a few questions to ponder: What do you do to prepare to receive that precious gift of Holy sacraments? What do you do to prepare to celebrate the coming of Christ during the Advent season?

I'm sure for many, by the time you read this article, your homes will be decorated for the season. Perhaps invitations are being sent to family and friends for the holidays or maybe someone is busy decorating an ugly sweater! I know this season can get very busy and hectic. You need only to look at our church calendar to see that even as a church, yes, we are busy too. However, it is my hope that you remember to pause, reflect and enjoy the season—especially in all the preparation! I encourage you this year, amidst your preparations, to be sure to make some room. For what you may ask? Be sure to leave room to truly prepare your heart and minds to once again celebrate the coming of our Lord. If I remember correctly, we have a Chrismon tree. I hope to see the Greek alphabet letters Alpha and Omega as they are Advent symbols. This comes from Revelation 1:8: "'I am the Alpha and the Omega,' says the Lord God, 'Who is, and who was, and who is to come, the Almighty.' " This is truly a reminder of the reason for the season!

My brothers and sisters in Christ, may the preparations you make this Advent season keep the light of Christ bright in your hearts this season. I'm looking forward to sharing that light with you all soon!

Grace Food Pantry Makes a Difference in Our Community

Most of you are aware that one of the outreach ministries of Grace Lutheran is the Food Pantry. But do you know what is involved in carrying out this ministry? It takes a lot of volunteers and money to purchase the food we give out.

The Grace Lutheran Food Pantry serves residents in Anderson, Morgan, & Roane Counties. Those receiving food are required to complete forms that provides information required by the USDA (name, address, number in household, & source of income.) That information needs to be updated annually. Families are only allowed to pick up food once a month. They stay in their cars and a volunteer goes out to get the names of the clients.

Food is purchased from The Second Harvest Food Bank of East Tennessee each week. The

food can be purchased from Second Harvest at a much lower price than it could be purchased in a grocery store. Most

weeks, Second Harvest has USDA foods & produce available. Those items do not cost anything. Toilet paper & soap are purchsed from Dollar Tree. We spend \$1,000 to \$1,500 at Second Harvest each month and \$480 each month at Dollar Tree. Panera donates whatever bread is left over from the previous day.

We have a group of volunteers with trucks that go to Maryville to pick up the food at Second Harvest every Wednesday. There is a group of men who unload the truck when it returns to the church and unpacks the food and puts it on the shelves.

Each family is given 6-8 bags of food. They are given chicken & tomato soup, tuna, green beans, corn, cereal (when available), rice, pinto beans or other legumes, mac & cheese, spaghetti, spaghetti sauce, muffin mix, pancake mix, peanut butter, canned fruit, bread, toilet paper & soap. When available we give out meat, eggs, margarine, cheese, and produce.



FOOD PANTRY NEEDS:

- A couple more drivers with trucks to pick up food on Wednesdays. (A second truck is needed if the order is more than 1,000 pounds of food.)
- Egg cartons we often receive boxes of donated eggs and need cartons in which to put them.
- More volunteers to serve as substitutes.
- We would also like to have a volunteer who is willing to learn how to do the ordering and getting the names of the families in line to pick up food.
- Monetary donations and/or food items.



THE FOOD PANTRY DOES NOT NEED ANY MORE BAGS OF ANY KIND AT THIS POINT IN TIME. We have two big trash cans full of bags and a large garbage bag full of bags. We don't have the space to store any more bags right now & we don't want to create a fire hazard. You will be advised when bags are needed again.

In November, the Food Pantry served 143 families on the three Fridays we were open. Of the 391 individuals served, 132 were under 17 and 106 were over 60. We are serving roughly 10 new families each week. The need is there and is only going to get larger as food assistance programs are cut.

We are so thankful for all the donations that are given whether it be time, money, or non-perishable items.
