When someone receives a Stephen Minister, they get the care and confidential listening of a carefully matched and trained congregation member who is thoughtfully selected to be a Christian friend, someone who listens, cares, prays, supports, and encourages them. A Stephen Minister meets faithfully each week with his or her care receiver for as long as there's a need. Having a Stephen Minister is an opportunity to have someone you can talk to about the anxieties and concerns of this world with all its uncertainties. Having a Stephen Minister means you've got someone to turn to when the circumstances of your life seem overwhelming.

Stephen Ministers lend an empathetic ear and can be a caring touchpoint to the Christian community when it is needed the most. Pastor Rosalina (Rosy) Rivera 'The Light Within Us' Should Not Be Dimmed



You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven.- Matthew 5:14-16

Although the holiday season is now behind us, there are still messages of light lingering in the air as we enter into the season of Epiphany. Epiphany means "to reveal." So too, as we begin the year 2024, there is much that remains to be seen for our church this year. Before, we talk about the church stuff; I thought I would share some "light."

When we think about light, we are often either blinded by it; in need of it; have too much of it and can be overwhelmed by its beauty. I am a person who prefers to have nightlights in every room of my home. There is some comfort in knowing that if I must venture out of my warm bed on a cold winter night that there will be light to light wherever I want to go.

I might remember a long time ago that there used to be those Christmas lights that had liquid in them and as the electricity heated them, they would bubble up creating quite a spectacle on a Christmas tree. I miss seeing those. I think they served as a reminder of the light that "should" bubble up in us after the Good News of Christmas!

We began a new church year together as I began my ministry here at Grace on December 1. It has been a very busy time to start in the church; however, I have been overwhelmed by the compassionate grace shown to me by many of you. Many of you carry "your light" brightly to others in and outside of our church and I am proud that you do. The various ministries we do as a church should remind us all of the light we do indeed share with others.

When we turn on the television or read the news today, it is easy to say, "Joy is NOT present" in our daily lives. But in the stillness of the lights we have probably taken down, among the cold of winter, and certainly in the manger, joy was and IS present today. Despite all the negativity of our world today, joy is often something that we must seek to find-just as the wise men did years ago.

These words from Matthew's Gospel should serve as a reminder to us all that just because the "physical lights" of the season may be gone, that does not mean that the light within us should be dimmed! Instead, it should serve as a reminder of the light of Christ, which continues to shine within us all. As we enter into this short Epiphany season, may YOUR light always shine brightly so that others may see your good works and glorify our Father in heaven.

We will do much together as a church in 2024. I look forward to visiting with all who have signed up for home blessings this Epiphany season. As I mentioned in church, it really is not a "Lutheran" tradition, but it is a good way to ensure that every time you leave your home, you carry the knowledge that you and your home have been blessed. If you have not signed up, there are still slots available. You can sign up on our website under the Pastor page or we also have a paper sign up here at the church.

Other things on the horizon; as requested, we will add morning services during the Lenten season on Wednesday mornings, beginning on Ash Wednesday at 11 a.m. This will allow those who cannot drive at night to worship during the Lenten season. We will keep Wednesday services short with no communion, except on Ash Wednesday and during Holy Week. Services will follow a similar format as we did during Advent. I hope to see more of you during the Lenten season.

In the meantime, please know that I am here in the office most days from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and would welcome visits from time to time. May your light shine bright this Epiphany and always!

Dec. is Busy Month for Grace Food Pantry

In December, the food pantry served 120 families. There were 306 individuals served. Of those 306 individuals, 69 were under 17 and 135 were over 60. The pantry was able to get USDA chicken leg quarters, canned peaches, raisins, walnuts, lentils, tomato sauce, & rice during the month of De-

cember. We were also able to get potatoes, onions, and baby carrots. All USDA products and produce are free. This helps to keep the costs down.

The food pantry could use a volunteer who would be willing to learn how to use the computer to help with the signing in of those who come to receive food. We could also use another truck to help pick up food on Wednesday afternoon. We have volunteers scheduled to pick up each week, but sometimes we need a second truck for pick up. We don't have a regularly scheduled driver on the 5th Wednesday of the month, so we call upon our back-up drivers. For more information or to volunteer, please contact Donna Hoglund at 931-248-5101.

The food pantry can still use egg cartons. *Right now, we have all the bags that we need.* Donations of food, toilet paper, soap, and money are always welcome.



Upgrades Planned to Grace Audio-Video Systems

During the pandemic, Grace began streaming our services, a practice that continues as an important part of our ongoing outreach program. It has evolved from Zoom using an iPhone to YouTube and a video camera. Feedback from those watching online has identified numerous shortcomings. In an attempt to provide a higher quality presentation, both online and in person, efforts have been underway to identify improvements to the audio-video systems. Activities include observing what other congregations are doing and identifying desired upgrades to our systems. Proposals and quotes have been solicited from several local companies specializing in church solutions. Included in the planning are additional cameras, monitors, and better microphones and speakers in the sanctuary.

These proposed changes will be presented to the congregation in the near future. In the meantime, input is welcome. Contact Terry Domm, Ingrid Busch, or any member of the Administering Commission with your thoughts or questions concerning the direction Grace is moving.

Glorious Music Fills Grace During the Christmas Season

On Sunday, December 17, at 10 a.m., Grace Lutheran Church Chancel Choir and Praise Team members sang "A New and Glorious Morn" by Lloyd Larson (Photos on Page 12). Currently based in Minnesota, Larson has been writing music, especially music for choirs and worship, for the past forty years. "A New and Glorious Morn" is his newest cantata.

During the 4 p.m. Christmas Eve service at Grace Lutheran, a Christbased holiday song entitled "Christmas Is Love" made its "world debut," being performed live for the first time anywhere. Dr. Paul Gurecki presented the song as a solo with piano accompaniment by David Ensley.

Christa Froeling, an Educational Audiologist with Tennessee Schools for

the Deaf (and an American Sign Language specialist), interpreted it with sign language.

"Christmas Is Love" was written by Rod Guge (Slade's cousin) in 2015 as a Christian response to a number



of much-publicized terror attacks that occurred that year, some during the holiday season. He says the song was "written in response to the Christmas-season attacks in San Bernardino, CA (where I used to live), where 14 were killed and dozens seriously injured by gunfire, and Paris, France, when 500 people were killed or badly injured."

If you were unable to attend the Christmas Eve event in person you can access the entire program online via Grace's website. The song "Christmas Is Love" can also be accessed online by two means: 1) via the website at <u>www.ChristmasIsLove.net</u>, which has been visited by some 2 million people (primarily from overseas); or 2) via the lyric video at this address on the YouTube platform: Christmas Is Love 122520.

On December 31, one service covered Lessons and Carols and everyone sang familiar Christmas carols with special accompaniment by Susan Gunning on violin and Barbie Schmitt on flute.

The Love Offering for January will support TORCH (Tennessee Out-Reach Center for Homeless).

TORCH opened its doors in January 2013 as the only comprehensive homeless service in Anderson County, TN. Because there is no shelter in the county, TORCH operates the Housing First model. Efforts are made to find affordable, sustainable housing as quickly as possible. If extra financial assistance is needed after an address is established and a client qualifies an agreement may be made to assist for a predesigned amount and/or time. The plan is called "Shelter in the Future Home" and is a much more cost-effective way to assist those housed in reaching self-sufficiency. The first step in future success is establishing a permanent address.

Finding homes is becoming more difficult as much of the available local housing is no longer locally owned. The new owners are reluctant to house the homeless and approval can be a lengthy process. TORCH determined that it would be more cost-effective to build temporary housing than to pay for hotel stays.

TORCH recently purchased lots from the Oak Ridge Land Bank and constructed Bookhart Village on Hamilton Circle. Six families with children or up to 30 people now have housing up to one month while they try to find more permanent housing. The Village has been so successful that TORCH is raising funds to build more temporary housing.

DIALOGUES AROUND THE CROSS

This past September 22, in coordination with our congregation, the Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, and the Chaplaincy Program of the Theological Community of Mexico where I serve as professor, I began a weekly online activity via Zoom called "Diálogos en torno a la cruz," or "Dialogues around the cross." Those hosting the activity have been Rev. Miguel Angel Solórzano, the pastor at Good Shepherd, and Rev. Hugo Gallardo, a Presbyterian pastor and professor at the Theological Community directing the Chaplaincy program (with me in photo at the church where he serves).



I came up with the idea for this activity after teaching a course in the spring semester on my primary area of research, namely, the meaning and interpretations of Jesus' death and the cross. The activity is open to any who wish to connect to the Zoom session and runs from 7:00 to 8:30 pm Mexico City time every Friday evening. I begin with a reflection that lasts for about 25-30 minutes, and this is followed by two ten-minute reactions to the reflection from participants invited by Pastor Miguel and Pastor Hugo. Every Friday different participants are involved and include pastors, theologians, congregational members, and past and present students. After the reactions, we divide up into small online discussion groups and continue the dialogue by reflecting for another 20 minutes or so before coming back together and sharing some of the things that were discussed in the different groups.

While all of the reflections revolve around the cross in some way, the themes vary considerably. On some occasions, we look at Bible passages that relate to Jesus' death and the cross. On other occasions, we explore themes related to history and Christian thought. In October, for example, we reflected on "The Cross and the Conquest" in connection with what is traditionally known as Columbus Day but is now commonly called Indigenous Peoples' Day (October 12), and also dedicated two sessions to examining Martin Luther's theology of the cross.

OCTOBER-DECEMBER 2023



In November, we focused on the subject of the cross and violence, relating it to the "feminicidios" or killing of women that is rampant in Mexico and other forms of gender violence. Beginning in Advent, we have been relating the cross to themes such as the account of the massacre of the infants of Bethlehem ordered by King Herod and the story of the manger.

While the number of those attending each week has varied between 10 and 25 or so, in total over 80 different persons have attended at least one of the Friday sessions. These have included people from many different countries in Latin America as well as the U.S. The sessions are recorded and then made available on my <u>Youtube channel</u> for those who are not able to attend. Plans are to continue the Dialogues in the coming year. All are welcome, though the activity is of course in Spanish! LAS POSADAS IN MEXICO

One of the most important traditions in Mexico revolving around the celebration of Christmas is known as Las Posadas. In Spanish, a posada is a lodging or inn. The name refers to the story of Joseph and Mary asking for lodging at the inn in Bethlehem and being turned away. In homes and at other localities throughout Mexico, such as churches, schools, and places of work, that story is reenacted every year in combination with group celebrations and festivities.

The celebration of Las Posadas dates back several centuries to the colonial period of Mexico. The festivities begin on December 16 and last until December 24, although nowadays people often participate in them only once or twice during that period rather than doing so every evening during the nine days.



According to the traditional manner of celebrating a Posada, a group of people carry a small figure of the Virgin Mary and Joseph, who are called the "peregrinos" or pilgrims. With candles in their hand, they stand outside the closed door as they sing a stanza of a traditional song in which they ask to be allowed in and given lodging. Another group of people inside responds with a stanza in which they tell the pilgrims to go away because there is no room and they do not know them.

The two groups continue to alternate stanzas of the song, with the group outside the door begging to be shown mercy and let in, while the group inside the door insists that the pilgrims go away and leave them alone. Finally, however, the group inside recognizes the pilgrims as Joseph and Mary, the mother of God, and opens the door to let the pilgrims in. After the participants are all joined together, the festivities begin. These often include more singing and reenactments of the Christmas story. In many cases, children dress up as the Virgin Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, and the wise men, who are known as the three kings. They also take turns breaking piñatas, which are filled with fruit, peanuts, and candy. Usually the children are lined up according to their height so as to give the smaller children the opportunity to try to break the piñata first. In this way, all the children have a chance to try, since it is the larger ones who generally have the strength to actually break it.

Although today there are many different sizes and shapes of piñatas, the piñata traditionally used for Las Posadas is the one with seven spikes or cones. These are said to represent the seven deadly sins of anger, lust, pride, envy, greed, laziness, and gluttony. The bright colors bring to mind the temptation to sin, while the breaking of the piñata symbolizes the overcoming of that temptation.



Naturally, there is plenty of food and drink at the Posada as well. These include sweet bread, tamales, tostadas, and buñuelos, which are large round disks of crispy fried dough covered with sugar. Traditional Christmas punch with a variety of fruits and sugar cane is also a must!
