

March Music to Celebrate Women Composers

On March 10th, we celebrate Women Composer Sunday. This initiative was commemorated at Grace by David Ensley, who will feature organ music by the Swedish composer Valbourg Aulin. A protégé of the celebrated composers Niels Gade and Jules Massenet, among others, Aulin spent most of her life in her native country composing, performing, and teaching until her death in 1928. In the 1990s her music began to be heard again after decades of undue neglect.

The Chancel Choir will celebrate Women Composer Sunday by singing "Promised Land" by Natalie Sleeth, the American born composer of hymns and choral music whose works have retained a place in hymnals and choral repertoire since her death in 1992.

We are enormously grateful to Mr. Ensley for his input and experience that help us to acknowledge this day honoring and celebrating the multitude of women composers whose gifts have often been so unfairly overlooked.

Pastor Rosalina (Rosy) Rivera Lenten Season Reminds Us to Slow Down

Be patient then brothers and sisters, until the Lord's coming. See how the farmer waits for the land ________ to yield its valuable crop, patiently for the autumn and spring rains.

James 5:7



I admire farmers. I always have. In my first call, my congregation had many farmers. All with a wide variety of gifts. Some were steer farmers. Some were corn and cotton farmers. And still others grew Texas peaches and vegetables which were always shared with the church and the food pantry. In my experience, most of the farmers I have ever known have similar characteristics. Most are very loyal and very generous. They are very prideful of their work and work long hours often despite terrible weather. Whether it rains too much or too little, they are always at work. One of my favorite farmers in that congregation passed away. He was on the call committee that interviewed me for my first call. His name was Lamar. I could tell he was a Texas farmer. He would always wear some version of jeans and his plaid shirts with button snaps and his skin was always tanned from being outside too long. Lamar had a BIG heart for the church and its mission. He was always talking about the church doing more.

And I distinctly remember him asking me when I interviewed, "what plans do you have in mind when you think about moving our church forward?" I thought it was a bold question for a first interview, but I was immediately impressed by him.

Soon after moving to the Pflugerville area, I quickly learned that Lamar's "fire for mission" was infectious. He was a trend setter. He built elaborate round stages for a "proper stage production" for the kids Christmas play. He built a small church replica and an additional seated trailer for church members to ride on during parades in the city. He was always looking to the future even as death came too soon for him. He became very ill and I still remember that last time I spoke to him, he took my hand and said, "Never stop trying to move our church forward. Look to the future, while learning from our past." I promised him I would, and it was a tall order and a lot to live up to.

Lamar's legacy lives on at my former church. His tenacity and patience were a large part of who he was. He once told me "In order to be a great farmer you have to be patient. You can't rush nature." His fields were just right down the street from the church and they were always so lush and green. While he was always working on some church project, he also knew about timing. I would always ask him what he was working on and he would say, "Something. But I'll let you know in good time." My inner impatient self would always struggle with that. Like some of you, I don't tend to be a very patient person. If I can get something done sooner than later, why not get it done? Perhaps because I need to remember that it's not always about "me."

We live in a world which always seems to be in a rush. Technology has changed our mentality about having things "quick and right now." We can download or stream and get things instantly. In Ohio, I even saw drive through convenience stores where you stay in your car and someone picks up and hands you whatever they have that you may need. But my patience is always tested when I have to drive the speed limit. You see, I have always had a "lead" foot and tend to go over the normal speed anywhere I go (unless it's a school zone)!

I think this text reminds us that we have a lot still to learn about patience. Patience about adjusting to new things. Patience about getting things done. Patience about new ministries. Patience as we continue to grow as a church. We have a great many future large projects just on the horizon—but yes, that too will require our patience!

Maybe this Lenten season will be a reminder for all of us to just slow down. We can all simply take a deep breath and enjoy where we are. As we prepare to celebrate Holy Week this month and wait patiently for the buried Alleluias to return and the spring rains to fall when warmer temperatures come to finally bring an end to winter. It is my prayer that in this Lenten season you dig deeper in your faith, and as the rains fall this spring, may your faith be renewed and rejuvenated.

Sunday, March 24, 2024 – Palm Sunday 9:00am & 11:15am

Food Pantry - The Food Pantry remains open as a drive-thru. It served 153 families in February. There were a total of 381 individuals in those families. Of those individuals 125 were over 60, 104 were under 17, and 152 were 18-59 years of age. On March 1, the Food Pantry will be collecting grocery bags again. We are always thankful for any contributions of food, money, time, & other items that are donated. The Food Pantry partners with Second Harvest Food Bank of East Tennessee to provide food for the hungry in Anderson, Roane, & Morgan Counties. Membership Approves Budget; Council Talks Upgrades



Highlights from the January/February Congregation meeting include:

• Congregation passed the 2024 budget which includes a deficit of \$15,722.

• Valerie Hansen was re-elected to serve another term on the Endowment Task Force

• Betty Dagley and Donna Gurecki volunteered to attend the Southeastern Synod Assembly.

Highlights from the February Council meeting include:

- Council approved two proposals by the Administrating Commission as presented by Terry Domm regarding technology upgrades to enhance both services and our online (YouTube) presence. First was a motion to upgrade the wireless and office/security network at a cost of up to \$12,000 from undesignated memorial funds. Second was a motion to upgrade the audio (microphones, etc.) portion of the technology proposal for a cost of up to \$50,000 also from undesignated memorial funds. The balance in undesignated memorial gifts was over \$77,000.
- Council discussed having an appeal for members to contribute towards the growing needs of technology.
- Council created the following goals for 2024 during a Saturday retreat. Increase attendance, connect with unchurched, and increase commitment.
- Council approved Betty Dagley and Donna Gurecki as delegates to the Southeastern Synod Assembly.
- Pastor Rosy discussed the need to practice an emergency evacuation. It was suggested to have it on September 8. More information to come.

May the longer days and more light serve as a reminder that Jesus' Light surrounds us with joy and peace in all our days.

Second Harvest is First in the Fight Against Hunger

The March Love Offering will go to the Second Harvest Food Bank of East Tennessee. Second

Harvest Food Bank of East Tennessee is leading the community in the fight to end hunger in 18 East Tennessee counties. More than 230,000 East Tennesseans are at risk of hunger, uncertain where their next meal will come from.

Second Harvest Food Bank of East Tennessee has the following programs:

Empowerment Services Food for Kids Food Rescue Mobile Pantry Nutrition Access Partner Agencies Senior Outreach



The Food Rescue Program:

Prevents waste by rescuing fresh fruits, vegetables, dairy, meats, and other types of donated goods, including clothing, diapers, furniture items, and household products.

Partners with food manufacturers, grocery stores, restaurants, and farmers who generously donate these goods.

Prevents good, usable products from being wasted *and* provides individuals with high-quality, fresh, nutritious foods they may not otherwise have access to. This past year, our team rescued 10,149,061 pounds of product for our East Tennessee neighbors.

The partner agencies are community organizations who work with Second Harvest to distribute food out into our 18-county service area. Often, these partner agencies are what we refer to as food pantries. In order to become a partner of Second Harvest, agencies must meet a certain set of qualifications and follow our agency guidelines, including food safety training.

Second Harvest provides three meals with every \$1 donation, and 95.7% of funds are spent on programs.

In 2023:

The FY 23 budget was \$12.8 million. 20 million meals were distributed in our community. Volunteers contributed 29,072 service hours. Second Harvest received 5,730,196 pounds of produce. The food drive received 201,816 pounds of food. There were 24,581,943 pounds of food distributed to the 18 counties. The average number of neighbors served each month were 182,141.

Grace Lutheran Food Pantry is a partner agency with Second Harvest and orders from them the food it gives out on Fridays. USDA goods & produce are free. The cost per month for food (canned & dry foods such as rice, spaghetti, etc.) from Second Harvest is roughly \$1,000. A recent weekly purchase of food cost \$287 which is a fraction of what it would have cost at retail which would have been \$1,820.

Equipping God's People for Ministry

Christian worship is not a spectator sport. Our liturgy is the work of the people. There are numerous roles to be filled. For most of them – the choirs and bell choir, ushering, serving as liturgist or member of the Altar Guild – someone is available to help newbies learn what to do. To equip our members to engage in ministries related to worship and encourage broader participation, the Worshipping Commission has undertaken to offer a series of workshops to support those who may be interested in taking part in different aspects of worship.

At our first workshop on February 10, a group of us – Christy Gipson, Pastor Rosy, members of the Altar Guild, and I – burned last year's palms from Palm Sunday and created the ashes that were used by Pastor Rosy on Ash Wednesday this year. On the same day, the Altar Guild met with Pastor Rosy to discuss setup for upcoming worship services.

Our next workshop will offer the opportunity to find out more about prayers for healing and anointing. We have begun to offer prayers and anointing for healing on third Sundays in both services, and we will also have a healing service on the Wednesday of Holy Week. To make this work, we will need two volunteers for each service. The practice of anointing and praying for healing is a deeply spiritual experience.

Worshipping will hold a short workshop for those who would like to know more. We will assemble in the sanctuary on **Saturday, March 16, at 10:00 a.m.** We will have sample prayers and anointing oil available and an opportunity to practice. If you are interested and this date doesn't work for you, please let me know, as I am more than happy to schedule another session.

More workshops will be held after Easter, including one on pet blessings and one on planning your own funeral service. Stay tuned for dates!

Stephen Ministry Celebrated on Sunday, March 17



Sunday March 17, 2024 will be a celebration of Stephen Ministry for the congregation. During the service we will commission our two new leaders, Stacey Garrick and Margaret Cumberland, and our two new Stephen Ministers, Candy Yugo and Beverly Bauman. There will be a reception between the two services. Please join us to welcome our new ministry members.

Stephen Ministry was started at Grace in 2015. As a Stephen Ministry congregation, we're part of more than

10,000 + Stephen Ministry congregations from more than 150 denominations worldwide. More than a half-million laypeople have been trained as Stephen Ministers. Stephen Ministry was developed in 1975 by Dr. Kenneth Haugk, a pastor and clinical psychologist, who saw that he alone as pastor could not provide for all the caring ministry needs in his congregation. So he began training lay people, Stephen Ministers, to help provide high-quality Christian care to those in need. It was named after Stephen, one of the first laypersons who was commissioned to go out and care for those in the Christian community. Check out Acts 6:1-6.

What Is a Love Offering?

Love Offerings are special offerings to help with ministries not funded by the Grace operating budget. This includes the Holiday Baskets, Angel Tree, Woodland School supplies, the Community Assistance fund and community non-profits. The Serving commission chooses the monthly ministries each year and provides information on these ministries in *The Light* and announcements. At Pastor Rosy's installation a special offering was collected for the Community Assistance Fund (or what used to be called the Pastor's Discretionary Fund) to help those in our community.

The Food Pantry also is not included in the Grace operating budget. Traditionally, the second Sunday of each month has been labeled Food Pantry Sunday. Thank you to all members and community contributors for the year around support.

Sanctuary Tapestry gets Cleaning by Stanley Steemer in January

The 14 x 12 1/2 ft wool tapestry was woven by Ulrika Leander and was hung in the sanctuary in 1987. The tapestry is entitled "Grace to You and Peace" and includes colors of the liturgical year: violet, red, green and blue and many symbols of the church.

The four towers in the tapestry symbolize the four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. The twelve arches symbolize the gates of New Jerusalem. The seven gold lines rising from left to right represent the Holy Spirit. Across the bottom of the tapestry are four circles with symbols of baptism, communion, Word of God and Holy Spirit.
